

Friday, October the 18th 1850
This day took on board 5 cask of water
& 12 Bbls of potatoes had 3 natives

Saturday the 19th
This day had 3 natives on board took
2 Bbls of oil ashore & took on board 12 Bbls of
sweet potatoes & some squashes cabbage & banana
& cocoanut broom stuff

Sunday the 20th
This day
Nothing of note

Monday the 21st
This morning took 2 of the crew out of
the boat & took them on board the ship in
irons this forenoon 12 Hawaiians came on board
to make up the crew 2 of them were of the
original crew at 1 P.M. got the ship under weigh
and sailed out of the harbour left 18 whale ships
there at 3/4 P.M. the Capt. came on board. headed
forward for Waikoo

Tuesday the 22^d
This morning at daylight the ship was off
diamond head at 8 AM the Capt. went ashore
at Honolulu at 1.30 P.M. the Boat returned
with a pair of cutting jags & the 5th mates chest
that's all to this day & left the Capt. ashore

Wednesday October the 23^d 1850
This day the ship laying off & on
the Capt. & a boats crew ashore the Carpenter
went ashore in the boat & deserted at 4 P.M. the
boat returned to the ship the Capt. stopped ashore
hoisted the boat up & braced full stood off shore
under the top-sails at 2 double reef the fore top sail
& single reefed the main & mizen & veered ship in
shore heading North West expecting to fetch into
the outer harbor so called where there were several ships
anchored at 3 saw the appearance of a reef or shoal water
ahead orders were immediately given to veer ship while in
the act of veering the ship struck on the reef about
1/2 mile to the leeward of the channel to the inner harbor
having been set to the leeward by a strong current
one boat went to town to inform the Capt. that
the ship was ashore and to obtain assistance
to do whatever might be thought best towards
serving the ship several boats came from different
ships laying in the harbor
