

Remarks on board

Sunday Nov 14th

This day commences with strong gales from N. W. at 1/2 past five double-reefed the top-sails; and at seven furl'd them, and steered S. S. E. at five A. M. set double-reefed top-sails; and at twelve o'clock M. shook the reefs out and steered E. latter part of the day the wind hauled to W. S. W. and became more moderate Lat by obs 39° 42' N.

Monday Nov 15th 1841

This day commences with strong breezes from W. S. W. and fair weather - saw a ship steering Eastward at ten o'clock wind hauled to the south and blew heavy at eleven o'clock P. M. double-reefed the top-sails middle part of the day the wind baffling with heavy squalls accompanied with thunder and lightning; at five o'clock A. M. set the top-sails latter part of the day strong winds from W. S. W. and cloudy

Tuesday Nov 16th

This day commences with strong winds from W. S. W. and fair weather; at two o'clock P. M. furl'd fore-top-sail. middle part blew heavy with frequent squalls of snow hail and rain; at ten o'clock close-reefed main-top-sail and furl'd the fore-sail latter part strong winds from W. and weather more regular ship steering East all hands employed in getting the boats ready for whaling Lat 39° 44' N.

Elizabeth Barge

Wednesday Nov 17th 1841

This day commences with strong winds from W. and squally ship steering East at ~~ten~~^{one} o'clock P. M. set fore-sail and steered East by South wind gradually increased until the close of day at nine o'clock P. M. furl'd the fore-sail saw a barge the first part of this day close hauled standing to the Southward Lat by obs 39° 22' N.

Thursday Nov 18th 1841

This day commences with strong winds from W. and heavy squalls of wind and rain but soon moderates down; at five o'clock set fore-sail and fore-top-sail close-reefed middle and latter parts much the same as the first part all hands employed in getting the boats ready for whaling ship steering E. by S. Lat. 38° 36' N.

Friday Nov 19th 1841

This day commences with strong winds from W. and squally weather middle more moderate and better weather latter part strong winds from W. S. W. and very squally ship steering E. all hands employed in ship's duty (39° 58' Lat.) Long 92° 11' W. Chm

Saturday 20th Nov. 1841

This day commences with strong winds from W. S. W. and squally weather at five o'clock P. M. furl'd fore-top-sail first part of this day saw a ship standing to the Southward at seven o'clock A. M. set close-reef fore-top-sail. bent main spencer the latter part of this day towards the close of the day wind moderated and weather more steady all hands employed in ship's duty ship steering East Lat. 39° 41' N.
