Friday July the 25<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with strong winds from the SSE and the  
Bark steering W by N at sunset luffed to the wind  
and took in sail for the night with one sail in sight  
Middle part strong winds from the SSE and the Bark steering  
W by N and nothing in sight but one finback the crew at  
work on the rigging etc. latter part strong winds from the SSE  
and the Bark steering S W and by W and one sail in sight  
lat by obs 17° 35' longitude by obs 1° 54' west

So ends these 24 hours

Saturday July the 26<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with strong winds from the SSE and the  
Bark steering S W and by west with one sail in sight  
at sunset luffed to the wind and took in sail for the night  
heading W S West Middle part strong winds from the SSE  
and the Bark heading E SE at midnight wore ship heading  
S W daylight took in the jib and set the main course and the  
Bark heading S W and two sails in sight both Belling  
at 10 past 8 in the morning run off for a brig which  
proved to be the Annawan of Wallapaiet Wester  
spoke her and her boat came on board gave us good  
news which was that she had seen whales 12 times  
in 30 weeks and got 140 barrels latter part strong winds  
from the SSE and the Bark heading S W with one  
sail in sight the Annawan and 2 or three finbacks  
So ends these 24 hours lat by obs 17° 51' Lon 1° 54' west

Sunday July the 27<sup>th</sup> 1845

Commenced with strong winds from the SSE and  
the Bark steering to the S W with strong winds  
from the SSE and the Annawan in sight still  
at sunset shortened sail for the night as usual  
at daylight had 1/2 top sails about 8 in the A M saw  
a sail of the weather bearing supposed to be a whaleman  
steering to the S W under double reefed top sails  
at 11 A M saw a whale brig supposed to be  
the Annawan standing to the N E at 3 P M  
saw a large shoal of porpoises fastened to one side of  
the Annawan So ends these 24 hours lat by obs 17° 35' South  
lon by obs 2° 18' west

Monday July the 28<sup>th</sup> 1845

Commenced with strong winds from the SSE  
and the heading S W with the Annawan  
in sight still Middle part strong winds from  
the SSE and the Bark steering to the N E  
daylight saw a sail of the weather quarter luff  
part strong winds from the SSE and the Bark heading  
S W and a great number of finbacks in sight  
So ends these 24 hours lat by obs 17° 50' Lon  
by Obs 2° 18' west
