Thursday July 16<sup>th</sup> 1885

This day begins with light Northwesterly wind. several sails in sight. Employed in making out. Middle + latter parts Calm

For all this 24 hours light wind and calm. Employed in various ways.

Saturday July 18<sup>th</sup> 1885

This day begins with a light S. W. wind by the wind on both tacks. Spoke the Schrs. Bloomer. For the middle and latter part a fresh S. W. wind by the wind on both tacks.

Sunday July 19<sup>th</sup> 1885

For the fore part of this day moderate S. W. wind. Saw a school of square headed Grampus. Middle and latter part light wind and calm.

Lat. 37.55 N. Long 72.49 W.

Monday July 20<sup>th</sup> 1885

This day begins with a moderate N. E. wind. Sails in sight. Middle part the same. Latter part fresh. W. S. W. wind by the wind on both tacks.

Lat 37.34 N. Long 73.00 W.

## Brig. C. H. Adams. of Copenhagen

Tuesday July 21<sup>st</sup> 1885

This day begins with a moderate N. E. wind & fine smooth weather. Several sails in sight. Employed in various ways. For the middle + latter part fresh S. W. by N. wind. Steering by the wind on the southern tack under single reef top sail. Broke out water.

Lat 37.15. N. 71.24. W.

Wednesday July 22<sup>nd</sup> 1885

For all this 24 hours fresh. W. S. W. wind by the wind on the Southern tack. Very rugged sea running.

Lat. 35.30. N. Long 70.30. W.

Thursday July 23<sup>rd</sup> 1885

This day begins with a fresh. W. by S. wind and a moderate sea running. Steering by the wind on the Starboard tack under whole top sail. Middle and latter parts the same.

Lat 34.28. N. Long 70.04. W.

Friday July 24<sup>th</sup> 1885

This day begins with a moderate N. E. wind. Brig by the wind on the southern tack. Several sails in sight. Middle part squally with rain. Split the main sail. Latter part moderate West wind steering S. E. by E.

Lat. 33.06 N. Long 68.56.
