

I continue the day til midnight making 20 hours in this days work. At 2 P.M. a Pilot came on board to take the ship to Wood's Hole. Put under weigh and proceeded down Sound with the wind S.E. At 4 P.M. came to an anchor off the wharf at Wood's Hole.

Friday) April 24th 1835. Fresh gales from N.W. and a clear cold atmosphere. Having breakfasted at 8 A.M. took my baggage on board a Wherry Hook called the Branch bound for New Bedford. At 11 1/2 A.M. cast off from the wharf and passed through the Channel into Buzzards Bay and at 5 P.M. made fast to the wharf in New Bedford. Took my baggage to my Bro John Henry's who I found with other interesting acquaintances & friends enjoying a share of the world's blessing. Thus ends a Voyage of Two Years four months and three days of much information and interest.

The following Letter was written by the Wife of one of the Missionaries at Noahoo (Sandwich Islands) under the following circumstances. A Young Man, the second officer of a Whale Ship, had the misfortune to have his leg broke in an encounter with a Whale, and to have it amputated, and was left at Noahoo under the care of a physician. Somewhere about this time he was undergoing this suffering, a Brother of his, Master of a Whaler, died at sea, and the news of his death was received at Noahoo and transmitted home to his bereaved parents & family. As the Young Man recovered, he acquired dissipated habits, and had begun to addict himself to gaming and drinking, and was in the broad road to ruin, when he was addressed by the above lady, who was acquainted with his parents in the following terms of friendly advice & caution. It appears he slighted the advice and after having shown the letter to some of his companions threw it away. It was picked up and copied and returned to him again by some one of his friends.

See You will perhaps be surprised, at my addressing you, but permit me to say, the interest we feel in your situation, is my only motive. You have no kind mother or affectionate sister in these remote Islands, to administer to your necessities when suffering from pain and debility, or to raise the warning voice and say my Son, my brother. I need not speak to you of the temptations which surround you, for with these you are better acquainted than we are;
