

APR. 1836

Friday 8<sup>th</sup> these twenty four hours clear and pleasant  
at 2 P.M. got some boiling nothing in sight.

Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> these twenty four hours pleasant  
and had fine breeze steering N.E. by E. Nothing  
in sight so ends.

Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> these 24 hours clear and pleasant  
at 6 P.M. see the Island bearing N.W. by W. of us  
at 5 P.M. haul'd up the courses and took in  
the top-sail and tacked to the wind  
headed to the Eastward latter part backed up

Monday 11<sup>th</sup> First part of these twenty four  
hours light winds and cloudy latter part rainy  
at 8 A.M. came to anchor in St. George's Bay  
frank out and stowed down in the main  
hatch way at 1 P.M. sent a boat ashore  
and got 200 lbs of water so ends

Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> First part rainy and  
latter clearing all hands employed in  
getting off water and stowing

Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> clear and pleasant  
part got off 60 lbs of water at 1 P.M. went  
ashore after wood

Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> clear and pleasant all hands  
employed in getting wood and painting ship  
at 11 P.M. men run away

Friday 15<sup>th</sup> fine weather all hands employed  
in looking for the men

Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> cloudy and rainy all hands  
employed in stowing down water in the fore  
hole middle part got off wood latter part rainy

Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> these twenty four hours  
fine weather at 10 A.M. weighed anchor  
and stood out to sea latter part the  
land about 15 miles distant
