 All these 24 hours light winds  
 and calms from almost every  
 point in the compass, steering  
 N.W. by W. under all sail.  
 Lat. by Obs 10 22 N.  
 Long. by Obs 59. 09. 00 W.

Thursday September 11<sup>th</sup>  
 Commences light winds and  
 calms from the North and East  
 steering N. by W. under all sail  
 at 4 P.M. Saw a great  
 number of Sperm Whales  
 which appeared to be at some  
 Middle and latter parts  
 weather much the same  
 Lat. by Obs 11. 05 N.  
 Long. by Obs 59. 18 W.  
 Long. by S and C 59. 19 W.

Sunday 13<sup>th</sup>

Sunday October the 1<sup>st</sup> 1851  
 On board of the ship Genoa, on  
 her homeward bound passage  
 from St. Helena to Boston, in the  
 Lat. of 19. 44. N. and Long of 50. 58 W.  
 a very fine day, but very light  
 winds, and I am in very low  
 spirits, I have good & not large  
 hauls.

Saturday October the 7<sup>th</sup> 1851  
 Commences light winds and  
 clear weather, from S.E.  
 steering S.W. by W. under all  
 sail, at 12 M. spoke the Brig  
 Spigail of yarmouth S. I. with  
 lumber bound to the Havana  
 Lat. by Obs 25. 47 N.  
 Long. by Obs 56. 45 W.

Sunday October 8<sup>th</sup>  
 All the 24 hours light winds  
 and calms from S.E. steering  
 N.W. under all sail.  
 Lat. by Obs 26. 17 N.  
 Long. by Obs 58. 00 W.

Monday October the 9<sup>th</sup>  
 Commences fine weather from  
 S.E. steering N.W. under all sail,  
 Middle and latter parts much  
 the same

Lat. by Obs 27. 46 N.  
 Long. by act. 58. 47 W.
