 A journal of a Subaltern voyage in

 which sailed Saturday April the 20th for
 the Atlantic Ocean Captain Stephen
 Deland's Master

Remarks on board Sunday April the 21st

Commenced with fine breezes from the
 westward and good weather at three
 o'clock I left the harbor and stood
 out of the harbor and here it being
 for the Captain at half past four
 came aboard and set all sail and
 stood to sea made the anchors and
 shrouds and secured all for the night
 here and set the watches at sundown
 no more land here here points of the
 land here some eight miles off ship
 heading south by east half east by
 the wind later part became in strong gust
 in the light sails and the mainsail
 So ends latitude 39. 37 N Longitude 69. 30 W

Remarks on board Monday April the 22nd 1861

Commenced with strong breezes from the
 westward and rough weather at four I left
 singled reefed the foremast leaving a
 moderate gale at sundown about eight the
 light later part of the night had it
 more moderate turned the reefs out
 of the topsail at daylight maned
 the mast heads the watch employed getting
 the boats ready later part good weather
 steering east south east So ends
 no latitude
