

Remarks on board of Bark Marion of

Sunday Oct 21<sup>st</sup> 1843  
These 24 hours begins with strong winds from  
the North ship steering S.E. with all sail set  
The Watch employed in being ships duty at 2 P.M.  
steered S.E. by E at 3 P.M. took in some of the light  
sails. Haul the part at 12 P.M. had all the light  
sails set again. Latter part wind & weather  
much the same saw some herring & blackfish  
and one seal. Ends wind N.E.

Monday Oct 22<sup>nd</sup>  
These 24 hours begins fresh breezes from  
N.N.E. ship steering S.E. by E with all sail  
set weather cloudy. Middle part wind fresh  
in flutes at 10 P.M. set fore royal. Latter part  
strong breezes at daylight took in the royal  
weather squally with rain the watch employed in  
doing ships duty. Ends much the same saw a  
Halm big steering to the Westward

Tuesday Oct 23<sup>rd</sup>  
These 24 hours begins with strong winds  
from N.N.E. weather squally steering ship  
S.E. by E with top Sulland sails set. Middle part  
wind & weather much the same. Latter part wind  
veered to the North very squally so ends

Lat by Obs 33.28 N  
Long by Obs 36.29 W

Wednesday Oct 24<sup>th</sup>  
These 24 hours begins with strong breezes  
from the North with squally weather  
steering ship S.E. by E with top Sulland  
set at 10.12 P.M. set the main royal. Middle part  
wind more moderate weather clear. Latter part  
much the same with passing squalls of rain  
the wind veered around to the West the watch  
filling the cottle fulls &c. Ends with light  
winds from the S.W. Antoine... sick & off  
duty
