(July 6 1836)

Remarks on Wednesday July 5th 1836  
Came with moderate breezes from the S.W.  
and some what thick at 4 P.M. took our anchor  
at Clark's Point & Bedford and proceeded to sea  
with 25.000 lbs of blubber today  
So ended this day working out the bay with a  
heavy wind from the S.W. and clear  
They ended on Wednesday 26th July since that

Remarks on board Thursday 6th July 1836

Came with fine breeze from the S.W. and  
smoking at 4 P.M. the pilot left us at 7 P.M.  
Normans Land Island bore S.E. by E. 1/2 E. 1/2 S. 1/2 E.  
just by estimate from which I take my  
Departure Middle and latter part pleasant  
breeze from the S.W. steering to the S.E.  
at 10 P.M. spoke the ship Liverpool due from  
N. Bedford so ended with fine weather

Remarks on Friday 7th July 1836

Came with moderate breeze from the S.W. in  
steering to the S.E. in Co with ship Liverpool  
one more sail in sight a steamer  
Middle and latter part the same at 6 P.M. saw  
one 3rd mast and main top galley standing each  
employing fitting boats & ship Liverpool  
in sight a steamer with all sails set  
No observation this day  
one man sick & off duty & 6 casualties

Remarks on Saturday 8th July 1836

Remained with moderate breeze from  
the Westward Steaming E. by S. by compass  
Middle part very thick and off gun at 5 P.M.  
light breeze from the S.W. latter part the same  
with light wind and pleasant ship Liverpool in sight  
off La Duette with the ship N. Bedford due from N. Bedford  
one man sick and off duty
