

Remarks on Board Bark

Monday 23

Commences with light winds and cloudy weather with light rain squalls from the south vessel heading E.S.E. two sails in sight at sundown took in sail for the night a calm Middle part a calm with a heavy swell latter part strong winds from the W.S.W. steering S.E. Lat Long 34.45. 50.50.

Tuesday 24

Commences with strong breeze and a heavy sea running from the W.S.W. course E.S.E. two sails in sight steering east crew employed in various parts of ships duty at sundown took in sail for the night and kept her by the wind Middle and latter part squally weather so ends Lat Long 34.43. 48.40.

Wednesday 25

Commences with moderate breeze and cloudy weather from the west steering E.S.E. at 2 O'clock P.M. picked up a barrell of Peruvian oil crew employed in various parts of ships duty Middle and latter part light winds with pleasant weather so ends this day. Lat Long 34.35. 48.50.

Thursday 26

Commences with light winds and rain squalls from the west steering E.S.E. crew employed in various parts of ships duty at sundown took in sail for the night wind E.S.E. by the wind heading S.E. Middle part strong winds and squally weather latter part blowing a gale with a heavy sea running here to under a close reefed main topsail and fore or mast staysail so ends this day. Lat Long 34.22. 47.45.

Friday 27

Commences with a gale vessel here to and a very heavy sea running wind from the S.W. ship heading S.E. Middle and latter part moderate winds and fine weather saw Black fish lowered three boats and gave chase but without success crew on board and kept her E.S.E. Lat Long 34.17. 46.45.

Saturday 28

Commenced with moderate winds with fine pleasant weather from the W.S.W. steering E.S.E. crew employed in various parts of ships duty at sundown took in sail for the night Middle and latter part continue the same two sails in sight so ends Lat Long 34.33. 45.34.

Sunday 29

Commences with very light winds with fine pleasant weather from the west steering E.S.E. this is the day of rest at 2 O'clock P.M. spoke the schooner Admiral Blake of Marion this two months out with 30 barrells of sperm oil at sundown took in sail for the night Middle part a calm latter part light winds with pleasant weather saw Black fish and gave chase but without success so ends this day Lat Long 34.34. 45.42.

Monday 30

Commences with light variable winds and fine pleasant weather the Admiral Blake still in sight Middle and latter part fine weather from the eastward heading S.E. two sails in sight so ends Lat Long 34.09. 45.17.

Tuesday July the 1st

Commences with strong breeze from the E.S.E. heading S.E. saw six sails steering to the north crew employed in various parts of ships duty Middle part strong winds with rain latched ship heading S.E. latter part strong winds reefed the fore and main topsails and furled the light sails at 12 O'clock latched again heading North so ends Lat Long 33.45. 44.02.

Wednesday 2

Commences with strong winds from the E.S.E. ship by the wind heading N crew employed in various parts of ships duty Middle part very squally weather from the east latter part fine weather free from squalls heading S.E. one sail in sight so ends this day Lat Long 34.12. 44.08.
