

Ship Plover, of New Bedford, Bound

Friday, May 30th 1862

All Sail, bound with a light air from N.W. and good weather. Heading to the S.W. all sail out, at 4 P.M. wore ship to the S.W. Middle & latter parts heading from North to N.W. No ends. Caught a Porpoise. Lat 34. 36. North. Long by Obs. 65. 30. West.

Saturday, May 31st 1862

Squally, Begins with a brisk breeze from the West. S.W. to N.W. Heading N.W. & N.N.W. with all sail out, Middle part same squally, latter part strong breeze heading N.W. No ends. Lat 35. 53. N. Longitude by Chronometer, 66. 35. West

Sunday, June 1st 1862

Head Wind, bound with a strong breeze from W.S.W. to West heading from N.W. to N.N.W. under Moderate sail, at 2 P.M. sent down the Fore & Mizen Royal yards, took in the Mizen top sail, and all the light sails, reefed the Fore top sail, at 6 P.M. shook out the reefs. Middle part fine weather the wind from West to N.W. tacked several times, latter part light air from N.W. Saw two sails, no ends. Lat. by Obs. 36. 40 North Long by Obs. 67. 30. W

Monday, June 2^d 1862

Brig Times, bound with a light air from N.W. and fine weather, heading S.W. under all sail, at 3.30. boarded the Brig Times of Boston. Hoyt, Master, 4 days out bound to San Domingo. at 5 P.M. took a light breeze from S.W. steered N.W. by W. middle part Moderate breeze. latter part fresh breeze the wind S.S.W. at 12 noon. entered the Stream, saw two sails, no ends. Lat 37. 14 Long 69. 00

Tuesday, June 3rd 1862

All Sail, bound with a fresh breeze from South and fair weather. Steered N.W. by W. with every thing out. Middle part moderate, latter part, the wind hauled to the N.W. E. and lights saw Blackfish & No ends. Lat. 38. 27. N. Long 70. 19. W.

Wednesday, June 4th 1862

Foggy, Begins with a light air from N.E. to N.N.E. and fine weather. Heading from S.W. to N.W. with all sail out, saw Porpoises & caught one, saw lots of Blackfish, middle part foggy; the wind hauled out N. by W. at 3.40 the wind S.E. steered N. by W. all sail out, at 4.40. it cleared up, saw a ship bound East took the craft out of the Boats, and stowed it away. latter part foggy, no ends. Lat by Obs. 39. 27. N. Long at noon 70. 44 W.

Thursday, June 5th 1862

Squally & Rainy, bound with a light breeze from S.S.W. to S.S.E. and rainy, with some fog, steered N. by W. under all sail, at 5 P.M. took in the Top. G. S. Sails, & lower Studding sail, middle part blowing strong from the South, with heavy rain, shortened sail and lay aback, at 8.30. braced forward and made some sail. the wind west and raining hard. at 5.40. the wind north and blowing strong, at 9.40. wore ship to the S.E. the wind N.E. latter part blowing strong, saw a ship steering N.W. no ends. no Obs.

Friday, June 6th 1862

bound with a strong breeze from N.E. and rainy heading S.S.E. under short sail, at 12.30 noon wore ship to the North by W. and made some sail, saw a Schooner, at 5 P.M. saw the Vineyard Is bearing, N.W. Dist 20. miles. saw two sails.
