

Now got upon the Japan coast
The every night tove to
Our longitude being East
One hundred Sixty two
And all the month of may threw out

I was on the fiftenth day of June

We departed from the Cape
When we were laying to
The wather now became more smooth
Than it had been before
And now the ocean all around
In cheering aspect bore

July and August then we had
Fine wather all the while
And in the time we did procure
Full seventy tons of oil
The season being far advanced
I was drawing near the time
To leave the northern latitudes
And try asouthern Climate
For the Sandwich Islands then we steered
Sum few recruits to buy
And likewise sum water to obtain
And got a full supply

Oct the ninth at eight AM
The Isle of Omoia
A barriery SSE of us
off plainly this did see

And when the sun dispell'd his mist
That gathered in the night
When Moroti and Mowe
Did plain appear in sight
Then we haul'd up and steered west
Bill twelve the following night
Left Moroti on the left
The Ocean on the right
Then we lufft to and bore aback
Untill Daylight appeared
And then again we bore away
And W by South we steered
Same day while running fore the wind
About the hour of two
The plain discover'd right ahead
The Island of Woahoo
Then we run down abreast the bluff
On the wather part of the bay
And this kept laying of and on
Bill surprise the next day
Then we run in with a light breeze
Got every thing to rights
Let go our anchor to the ground
And lay two days and nights
Then a pilot we receiv'd on board
It being now our turn
And in the bay we did go
And more head and Stern
The graceful Dances from the shore
As soon as we were moored
Came paddling off their canoes
While others swam on board
