

Remarks on Board Ship Sharon

July 18th, this morning went ashore got two painters went up to the Blacksmith and got a band for the Breast-plate came on board put it on. I at up the copper bolts and brass-plate shrouds at 8 AM. Capt King came on board to see as the cold original crew had a very pleasant talk with him, employed during the afternoon in painting the iron work over the bow, clearing up decks and washing off, two painters employed to day, and four of us Yankers, two of them quite unwell during some part of the day

Sat 19th this day commenced with steering laid two men to work, besides the first employed the fore part in mending the flying jib and then bent it, a case of Barch of Sleds for on board Bark Behwin of Boston, I have been employed the fore part of the day in washing & mending the fore-logs. latter part of the day I went on shore.

Sun 20th this day very pleasant nothing worthy of notice to day

Mon 21 this day commenced with a light breeze of wind, commenced this day by washing of decks, felt quite sick, day after washing of went below and slept the remainder of the day, the latter part of the day I spent on shore

Tues 22nd this day I spent on shore going from place to place, to day they the ship received two boats, and a Mizen Ship Captain

Wed 23rd this day I spent on shore, at 3 PM I at discharged from the Sharon, leaving

Mon 23rd taken an order for my night, and also agreed to go in the Ship Addison, left my order with Mr Pitt as the Captain had not signed it, commenced to night to board at the Sharon Home on shore, spent the time in running from place to place frequently going down to the Consuls office intended to have slept to day, but the Consul was to busy, at 10 PM Capt Lawrence gave me my Consul money \$23 twenty three dollars, at night came on board of the Sharon and staid all night

Sat 25th from this date to Monday 26th I staid on shore, running from place to place, spent the greater part of my time up to the Home that B. F. New had, which we carried the Capt had retired on account of their being so many Capt bed-mates, they enjoy myself as well as can be supposed, considering all things, sometimes I make a short visit on board of the Ship Addison, on the twenty six the B. F. New's Board arrived here with lumber from
