

Remarks on board the Barque Ship, Warsaw
Saturday Nov 30th 1844

At 8 A.M. went onboard the Barque Warsaw
Capt. Bernum, bound to the N.W. coast

At 10 P.M. weighed our anchor and stood out
at 8 P.M. through the Ice Channel Wind light from the
bearing E.S.E. N.E. at 5 P.M. the Pilot left us nearly dead
Ois 8 miles from land S.S.W. at 4 P.M. stowed our anchors and
which we take chose watches Middle wind increasing and
our top hauling to the westward at 3 P.M. took in
the T.S. and S.T. sail so ends this day with
strong breeze sent down the Skysail pole

Sunday Dec 1st Strong winds and heavy sea at 6, reefed
S.S. the topsails and furl'd the gobs Middle and
latter the same so ends this 24 hours

Monday Dec 2nd First part strong gales at 5 P.M. closed
S.S.E. the topsails and double reefed the main
Middle furl'd the main and haul'd
up the spraker at 8 P.M. close reefed the M.S. sail
and hoist too heading to S.E. at 10 P.M. lost S.S.
sail so ends this 24 hours

Tuesday Dec 3rd and Wednesday 4th the weather the same all these
days about 3 P.M. the top reefed off sent
S.S.E. down the yard and dashed the mast
latter the wind chaled to the S. we reefed
S.S.S. to E. so ends this 24 hours

Thursday Dec the 5th this day commences with strong gales and
we cannot see the sun & clouds about 12 P.M. the gale broke, and
the stars seem to moderate Made whole of sails
S.W. set the M.S. sail all hands employed in fitting

Friday the 6th first part moderate at 7 P.M. set the M.S. sail
Middle part light winds with squalls of rain
S.S.S. hands employed in fitting the coats
so ends this 24 hours.
