

Wednesday August 15.

Begins with calm wind S.E. head S.E. by S.  
Gather pack from keels from NW head S.E. by E.  
Take sudden sails fore and aft. Passengers still continues  
sea sick. Lat 39.31 N Long by Obs 68.07 W  
- Gun Purposes - to windward.

Thursday Aug 16.

Begins with fresh wind from N.W. Course S.E. by E.  
of P.M. pumped ship & found a good deal of water  
in her. found two leaks to be both sides of her  
stem  
Leak 140 hooks in her  
Lat 38.17 N Long 65.15 W

Friday Aug 17.

Begins as the last instant blowing S.E. by E. Middle  
& latter light winds found the ship did not  
sink so much in light weather.  
150 hooks in to her  
Lat 37.39 N Long 62.56 W


Saturday Aug 18<sup>th</sup>

Begins with light winds blowing S.E. by E. and  
to the eastward - middle light winds head from  
S.E. 5 pm lashed ship - latter fine breeze from  
the eastward head to the south  
Lat 37.05 N Long 62.37 W

Sunday Aug 19.

Begins with fresh winds from the eastward head  
S. by E. Middle light winds to am lashed ship  
head S.E. to E.  
Lat 35.45 N Lon 61.46 W  
Gave a Bury reading to the crew  
Passengers still sea sick -

Monday Aug 20.

Begins with light winds head up S.E. to P.M.  
wind S.W. Course S.E. by E. Middle squally, took  
in fly jib & top gallant sails latter heavy  
breezes from the Course S.E. by E. 1/2 E. 1/2 E. fly jib  
& top sails and foretop sails. Spoke Bury  
Capt Lambert 15 miles 500 pm found home &  
sent letters by her. Lat Long 

Tuesday Aug 21

Begins with strong breeze from the S.W. blowing  
S.E. by E 1/2 E. Found the ship had more in  
rough weather about 200 strokes per hour  
Gave a long bark blowing S.W. by S. E. S. E.  
Lat 34.11 N Long 55.58 W

Wednesday Aug 22

Fresh winds. Mudding sails out steering S.E. by E. 1/2 E.  
Gave plenty of flying fish. Passengers getting better  
of the sea sickness. Nothing new, got up a carpenter  
tax bench for the carpenter use  
Lat 33.10 N Long 53.09 W

Thursday Aug 23<sup>rd</sup>

Fine breeze & clear weather going along about Eight knots  
with mudding sails out. Have seen a great deal of Gulf  
weed today. If the wind continues to hold in this quarter  
& to blow as fresh as it does at the present time we are  
in hope to fall in with the trades by Sunday next.  
Then hurray! for fine weather & fair winds. The passen-  
gers are all recovering from their seasickness, in fact  
some are entirely so already. When they all recover their  
health & spirits, we shall have some rare fun entertained  
with instrumental music, for we have several musicians  
with their instruments on board.
