 Monday <sup>the</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 these 24 hours commenced with a brisk breeze from the N.W. course N.W. by E. crying all sail; thick over cast. weather  
 tried the temperature of the water at 3 and 5 P.M. the thermometer stood at 61° in the evening entered the Southern edge of the Gulf the thermometer stood at 82° in middle part light breeze from the N.W. course N.W. at 12 midnight sharp lightning in the N.E.; at 7 A.M. a fine breeze sprang up from the Southward latter part much the same the watch employed in getting out some bread  
 Gay Head 301 miles Distant

Tuesday <sup>the</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 these 24 hours commenced with strong breeze from S to S.W. course N.W. at 3 P.M. saw three sails from the mast head steering to the Eastward at sunset tried the temperature of the water the thermometer stood at 81° in middle part light breeze from the N.W. and sharp lightning; at 1 A.M. the thermometer stood at 76° in latter part wind N.W. Barque heading N.W. by the wind Capt. Lane quite unwell with the head ache; the Carpenter at the mending board

Wednesday <sup>the</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 these 24 hours commenced with moderate breeze from the N.W. and thick weather Barque heading N.W. by E. at 8 P.M. wind headed, lashed headed up N.W. by N. middle part much the same latter part heading N.W. saw three sails from the mast head and two very large water spouts

 Thursday <sup>the</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 these 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the Northward Barque heading N.W. by E. at 3 P.M. raised Black Fish toward two boats chased till 4 with out success middle part light air from the N.W. latter I and Jerry unwell myself with a pain in my side and sick to my stomach took an emetic felt some relieved with I was at home where I could have proper care and good medical aid; at 7 A.M. raised Black Fish toward the boats caught two latter part calmed the watch taking off the lubber

Friday <sup>the</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 commenced with calm weather; at 2 P.M. a fine breeze sprang up from the S.E. course N.E. set the fore top mast studding sail middle latter part wind from S.E. to N.W. boiled out the Black Fish blubber saw one sail steering to the S.W.

Saturday <sup>the</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> Aug 1873 these 24 hours commenced with fresh breeze from the Southward steering N.E. middle part light breeze from the S.E.; at 12 midnight sounded got bottom in 30 fathoms; latter part wind East Barque N.E. unrigged the boats stowed the crate & lines away; went down the cutting pendant at noon sounded got bottom in 32½ fathoms
