

Friday May 27th 1851

Another day has passed away & the sun goes down in the far West - there has bin one merchantman in sight all day - fine weather & light breeze - we have put up the 90' blocks & put the spars in their places heading to the Eastward with a moderate breeze.

Saturday May 28th 1851

The first part of these 24 hours very fine weather - the latter part also fine with moderate & fair winds - there has bin one merchantman bin seen - through the day - we have now the rigging in in their places - steering E. by S. - May we sail get a fair of oil -

Sunday May 29th 1851

The first part of the day quite moderate the latter part it has bright up to be quite a fresh gale - there has bin much bin seen from aloft through the day; heading N. East the greater part of the day - to night under courses main topsail -

Monday May 30th 1851

Another day has past away after a while the sun goes down in the far west - the first part of the day quite a strong breeze - the latter part quite moderate with a cross sea running - through the day - steering E. by S. East there has bin specks of a sulphur bottom bin seen -

Tuesday May 31st 1851

Through the night have had it very moderate weather & fine - this morning picked up a spar - there has bin one merchant brig & sulphur bottom bin seen - steering E. by South with a fair wind -

Wednesday June 1st 1851

These 24 hours we have had a fine breeze from the Westward - there has bin one sail & a steamer passed close to us - to night, Linbacks & sulphur bottoms is all that has bin in sight - steering E. by North - May we see whales & be ofttanate with them -



Thursday June 2nd 1851

Another day has past away & the sun goes down in the far west & did us time to drag this baggage out after a while these 24 hours we have had very moderate weather the first part - through the day thick fog - then has not any thing bin seen - we have steered the channel & got some sheeting out down between decks - heading to the south east with a light breeze -

Friday June 3rd 1851

These 24 hours we have had thick fog & through the day thick & rain - there has not any thing bin seen moving - we have over hauled our channels & got them to rights & layed as fitted some - to night heading to the south East - Light wind

Saturday June 4th 1851

These 24 hours we have had very foggy weather there has not much of any thing bin seen - one sail passed close to us steering about as we are - fair wind steering E. by N.

Sunday June 5th 1851

Another day has past away - it has bin thick fog - for the whole 24 hours - so thick that what we could not see in a ships length - this morning we layed to & kept the East through the day - heading under four main topsail & jersail -

Monday June 6th 1851

These 24 hours the first part very thick weather the latter part it got up a little & so we could see a quarter of a mile - there has not a thing bin seen - steering East -

Tuesday June 7th 1851

The first part of these 24 hours foggy & rainy the latter part of the afternoon the wind halled in to the N. W with a moderate breeze - May we get a whale before long

Wednesday June 8th 1851

These 24 hours the first part squally & with strong breezes - this day has it in very pleasant with light winds from the N. West - there has bin one steamer one Linback & several merchantmen bin in sight - the first part of the day, steered E. by N. the latter part steered N. by East - Lat. 43° 30' N Long 26° 40' W } the first County \$5.00. 15 pounds of tobacco & a bottle of Brandy.
